- UNU will organize two "governors' summits" on the occasion of the 10th meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD/COP10) in Nagoya.
- At the public Biodiversity Governors' Summit on 19 Oct., five governors and vice governors of Japanese prefectures will introduce their local satoyama/satoumi support efforts, including such approaches as establishment of a biodiversity strategic vision and promotion of forest management through a specific local tax system. This event will include a keynote lecture by Prof. Kazuhiko Takeuchi (Vice Rector, UNU) and presentations by Governor Masaaki Kanda (Aichi), Governor Masanori Tanimoto (Ishikawa), Governor Toshizo Ido (Hyogo), Vice Governor Uichiro Taguchi (Shiga) and Vice Governor Shinichi Omura (Shizuoka). The presentations will be followed by a panel discussion on "Satoyama and Satoumi as a Momentum for Local Revitalization" (of communities suffering the effects of globalization and aging). Dr. Ahmed Djoghlaf, Executive Secretary of the Convention on Biological Diversity, Mr. Tsunao Watanabe, Deputy Director-General of the Nature Conservation Bureau of the Ministry of Environment of Japan, Ms. Akiko Domoto, Former Vice-president of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) and Ms. Anne McDonald, Director of United Nations University –Institute of Advanced Studies, Operating Unit Ishikawa/Kanazawa (UNU-IAS OUIK) will join the discussion as commentators
- On the following day, 20 Oct., the conclusions of the public summit will be incorporated into a presentation to policy makers and others at the Governors' *Satoyama* Summit. This summit, an official CBD/COP10 side event, will feature keynote presentations by Prof. Takeuchi, Vice Governor Etsuo Ogawa (Aichi) and Governor Tanimoto, as well as a discussion session on "*Satoyama* and *Satoumi*, From Japan's Experiences". Commentators will include Dr. Djoghlaf and Mr.Watanabe.
- Simultaneous Japanese– English interpretation will be provided for both events.
